Director's Summary of Accomplishments

Year 2004-2005

The major goals of the Women's Studies Center for 2004-2005 included: (a) enhancing the excellence of the undergraduate program and developing a Graduate Certificate program, (b) generating and promoting scholarship and creative work in Women's Studies, and (c) providing leadership on women's issues in the region through education and social and cultural programs. The goals and highlights of the accomplishments in each area are presented below.

A complete report of the activities of the Women's Studies Center for the period June 2004 to May 2005 is contained in the following pages, including: (1) a summary of the undergraduate program and the new Graduate Certificate program that includes enrollment for the undergraduate B.A. and Certificate programs and other undergraduate student activities and accomplishments, (2) the achievements of the Women's Studies faculty, and (3) advancement activities of the WSC.

GOAL 1: To enhance the excellence of the undergraduate program and to develop a Graduate Certificate program.

Accomplishments:

- Established a Graduate Certificate program begun in Spring 2005
- Enrollment increased from 2,781 (2003-04) to 3,734 (2004-05; including 3,543 undergraduate students and 191 graduate students)
- Courses offered included 101 undergraduate and 21 graduate
- Students majoring in Women's Studies increased to 104 (from 72)
- Students earning a Certificate increased to 124 (from 98)
- Provided academic advising for 228 degree and certificate earners
- Graduated 21 students with a B.A. in Women's Studies (up from 17 in 2003-04)
- Graduated 29 students with a WS Certificate (up from 22 in 2003-04)
- Proposed and offered fourteen new Women's Studies courses
- Faculty developed and offered three online WS courses enabling an online Certificate to launch in Fall 2005
- Internship program: 20 students participated
- Third year of Women's Studies Student Association (25 members)
- Hosted the 4th WS Student Conference (37 presentations; 100 attended)
- Published a journal, Making Waves, Vol. 3, based on the 2004 WS Student Conference
- Gave twenty awards to students ranging from \$150 to \$1,500
- Sponsored travel for 8 students to the Association for Women in Psychology conference in Tampa, Feb 2005 and for 5 students to the Florida Women's Consortium Lobby Days in Tallahassee, March 2005.

GOAL 2: To generate and promote scholarship and creative work in Women's Studies.

Accomplishments:

- Hired a Postdoctoral Fellow in Women's Studies (Van Tilborg) for 2004-05
- Arranged the signing of a Memo of Understanding between FIU and the University of Granada for collaboration and exchange between our WS programs (Morcillo, Rose). Travel to Spain was supported by WS and the FIU Transnational Center/Madrid Center
- Hosted presentations by 49 noted scholars, authors, filmmakers, artists, performers, and dignitaries
- Three Women's Studies Core Faculty, 22 Affiliated Faculty, and one Adjunct Faculty were active in publishing, grant reviewing, and editorial roles in 2004-2005. Accomplishments include the publication of one book, three book chapters, 11 journal articles, one creative work/performance, 5 curatorial projects, 18 book reviews, 6 grants, 22 conference presentations, 15 invited presentations, 8 editorial boards, and 7 awards.
- Sponsored a Faculty Representative (Friedman) to attend the United Nations, Commission on the Status of Women, 49th session
- Sponsored four presentations by faculty at national and international conferences

GOAL 3: To provide leadership on women's issues in the region through education and social and cultural programs.

Accomplishments:

- Continued Year 3 of the Women of Distinction Series to attract community support; drew audiences ranging from 40 to 100 at each of four events
- Year 4 of Friends of Women's Studies fundraising campaign (\$9,185 raised, including a donation from the Wollowick Foundation)
- Continued fundraising for Elaine Gordon Scholarship (\$7,428 contributed; endowment total=\$50,320)
- Established a Women's Studies Board of Advisors (a donating board) comprised of prominent women in the community (\$17,300 contributed or pledged)
- Viewings of the WS website increased greatly (from 11,317 visits in 03-04 to 17,365 for 04-05)
- Website for the FIU Women Faculty Book Club (<u>www.books.fiu.edu</u>) received about 200 viewings per semester

The Women's Studies Center was successful at meeting its academic and advancement goals for 2004-2005. Graduate enrollment increased sufficiently to support the establishment of a Graduate Certificate program, undergraduate enrollment was at an all time high, and the collaboration with the University of Granada was formalized. Faculty research on women and gender continued to be recognized at the national and local level. Last, the reputation of the WSC grew locally with the establishment of the donor Board of Advisors.

Roberta Fox *Board Chair*

Roberta Fox, P.A., Chair, Women's Studies Board, Lawyer and Shareholder for the Law Offices of Roberta Fox. Ms. Fox served as Florida State Senator from 1982-1986 and Florida State Representative from 1976-1982. She is a pioneer in family law reform, equal educational opportunity, employment background screening legislation, and changes to the evidence code concerning testimony by young crime victims. She has received many awards including the 1973 One of Ten Outstanding Young Women of America Award, the 1986 Florida Women's Lawyers Association's Judge Mattie Belle Davis Award for service, the 1996 Women of Impact VIII Award and a 2004 Pioneer Award, In the Company of Women, from Miami-Dade County.

Marjorie Adler is Marjorie H. Adler is Human Resources Director for the City of Coral Gables (2004-present). Previously, she was Chief Personnel Officer of Human Resources for the Miami-Dade County Public Schools (2003-2004) and for the School district of Philadelphia (PA) (1997-2002). She has extensive management experience in the private sector as well. Her areas of expertise include labor relations and recruitment strategies, organization development, and risk management. A forty year resident of Philadelphia, she was very active in the wider community, particularly in women's issues and cultural affairs.

Carol Alexander, Founder and President of Carol Alexander, C.P.A., PA, a public accounting firm serving the South Florida business community, provides income tax planning and preparation as well as business valuations. She serves on the boards of several professional and not for profit organizations. She has served two years as Club President of the Rotary Club of Miami Sundown. Among her personal interests are fitness, music and art.

Maria Anderson, Vice Mayor & Commissioner, City of Coral Gables, FL. Ms. Anderson is a Board Member of the Urban Environment League, and a Commission Representative for the Coral Gables Chamber of Commerce. She spearheaded a successful community visioning process for the revitalization of downtown Coral Gables, cosponsored with the University of Miami School of Architecture.

Gayle Bainbridge has made a career as an insurance agent in Coral Gables after her graduation from FIU in 1975 with a Bachelor of Arts in English. She serves on the Boards of the FIU Alumni Association, UM Friends of Music and is the Chairman of the Coral Gables Chamber of Commerce. Her hobbies are traveling, gardening and reading.

Elizabeth Baker is a lawyer with Baker & Cronig, LLP (family, real estate, banking and business law). She has been continuously certified by the Florida Bar in Marital and Family Law for 17 years. Because of her public service involvement with Safespace, she was recently recognized by the Florida Association for Women Lawyers, Miami-Dade County chapter, with the Mattie Belle Davis Award. She has been married for 32 years to Edward, a Professor of Business Administration at the University of Miami. She is the mother of two adult daughters. Her mother is 91 years old and lives in Massachusetts where she was one of the Bay State's first 100 women lawyers. Her personal interests include the study of Shakers, a utopian religious sect and collecting vintage costume jewelry.

Jeanne Becker is President of Becker Consulting Services, Inc. Public Relations and Marketing. She is former Vice President and National Marketing Manager for the American Bankers' Insurance Group in Miami, a recipient of the Robert B. Knight Outstanding Citizen Award (1998) for her volunteer efforts to revitalize downtown Coral Gables, and Rotarian of the Year (1995) for her efforts chairing the Gables Promenade--an event that raised \$60,000 for a domestic violence shelter.

Amy Dean is a certified circuit civil mediator and member of the American Arbitration Association Panel, 2004. Ms. Dean was a Judge (ret.) for the Dade County Circuit Court between 1991-2003 & Associate Appellate Judge for the 4th District Court of Appeals. She was also the recipient of numerous awards, including the Woman of Vision Award from the American Committee of the Weitzman Institute of Science (1999) and the Woman of Valor Award from the National Council of Jewish Women (1998).

Enrollment Summary (Summer 2004 – Spring 2005)

A total of 3,734 students were enrolled in the 101 undergraduate and 21 graduate courses offered in Women's Studies for the Academic Year Summer 2004 – Spring 2005. There were 104 students majoring in Women's Studies and 124 students pursuing an Undergraduate Certificate. From May 2004 to April 2005, 21 students earned a B.A. and 29 students earned an Undergraduate Certificate.

II. GRADUATE PROGRAM

Graduate Certificate in Women's Studies

Effective Fall 2005, the Graduate Certificate in Women's Studies became officially available for all students, graduate or undergraduate, who want to advance themselves in the area of women's studies.

Eligibility:

- All graduate students in an M.A. or Ph.D. program at FIU are eligible to apply to this program. The Women's Studies Center encourages graduate students from all colleges to participate.
- Undergraduate students in their senior year may take graduate level courses to complete their graduate certificate as a post-baccalaureate certificate.
- Students with a Baccalaureate degree from an accredited university may enroll as a non-degree seeking student and complete the graduate certificate.

Admissions Requirements:

Students applying for the Graduate Certificate in Women's Studies must meet the following requirements for admission in addition to submitting the application:

- 1. Have a minimum GPA of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale during the last two years of upper division coursework;
- 2. Statement of intent;
- 3. Two letters of recommendation;
- 4. Current résumé;
- 5. Official academic transcript.
- 6. UGS application.

Certificate candidates must complete a total of 15 CREDIT HOURS at the 5000 level or higher:

6 credit hours from the core + 9 credit hours from the list of graduate level electives = 15 credit hours.

Six (6) credits must be taken through the WSC and may be chosen from the following *core*:

WST 5905 Independent Study

WST 5990 Women's Studies Internship

WST 5992 Special Topics in Women's Studies

WST 5993 Feminist Theory



Professor Rebecca Friedman's research has focused on the history of masculinity in Russia. Her book examines behavior, loyalty and sociability among a generation of Russian university students that would reshape the Russian social and political landscape for decades to come. In particular, it explores the models of manhood that these young men encountered and created during their three to four years of study, including the respectable servitor, drunken comrade, honorable fraternity member, romantic friend and loyal son. This project offers a picture of the complex processes through which gender ideologies were forged and negotiated in the nineteenth century. Friedman also edited (with Barbara Clements and Dan Healey -- Palgrave/Macmillan 20020) the collection *Russian Masculinities in History and Culture*, which is the first volume in English focused on the growing field of Russian masculinity studies.
